This book is not meant to win arguments. It is meant to raise standards — including my own.

You may find parts of it challenging. You may disagree with certain interpretations or examples. I welcome that. The goal is not consensus, but clarity. Productive disagreement, grounded in shared respect for truth and evidence, is essential to democratic life.

If your group finds it helpful, you might consider discussing questions such as:

- How did modern media ecosystems become so polarized and asymmetric?
- Why are conspiracy narratives so psychologically compelling?
- How does identity shape what individuals are willing to accept as evidence?
- What role do institutions — journalism, courts, elections — play in maintaining shared reality?
- Can democratic norms survive when large segments of the population inhabit different informational worlds?

These questions are not easy. But they are necessary.

Thank you again for engaging seriously with this work. Conversations like yours — thoughtful, reflective, and willing to wrestle with complexity — are exactly what this book hopes to encourage.
